Blue September is the Prostate Cancer Foundation's national awareness campaign. Every year around 600 men die in New Zealand of prostate cancer.

This happens because men don't know how dangerous the disease is, they don't talk to their doctor about it, they simply don't do anything about it. This has to stop. ## Te Reo - Strategy Development

## 'Ng'

Kei te nui ngā kōrero e pā ana ki te whakakapi a te 'ng' i te 'n' ki roto i te reo ā tuhi ō Ngai Tūhoe. Kua tau te Kaaku kia waiho e tātou ō Te Waimana te 'ng' ki roto i ō tātou tuhinga katoa. There has been much discussion regarding the replacement of 'ng' with 'n' in our written Te Reo. Te Waimana Kaaku has already decided that our written Te Reo will remain unchanged and the 'ng' shall remain within it.

We are currently seeking your personal views regarding this kaupapa and invite you to participate in a short online survey. The survey will be accessible online until the 28th of September. We will publish the results and your whakaaro in issue 49 of Te Manu ō Te Waimana Kaaku. The survey does not ask you to identify yourself, so your responses will be unidentifiable.

#### Website

The original Te Waimana Kaaku Facebook page and group have been deleted but will be re-established with a link through this site.

It is also hoped that we can link to Kaaku surveys through the site, allowing global feed back, thus being more inclusive of our Whānau who reside out of Te Waimana & overseas.

#### **Projects**

Still awaiting Hapū development projects to come forward for support. There is lots of korero to the Projects Administrator about what she could initiate in terms of projects, However, the role is to support project development initiated by Hapū and Whānau. So bring in the ideas and let's have a look at how they can be grown into reality.

#### Te Kāhui Pakeke

Te Kāhui Pakeke ō Te Waimana have agreed that in Kaaku publications and written kōrero, the use of 'ng' will remain. This is supported by the Kaaku. Te Kāhui Pakeke have also agreed that cellphones are to be switched off during hui and karakia. They have also agreed that whakaahua are not to be taken of tupāpaku and within urupa. Ngā Hapū o Te Waimana are asked to support these decisions.

## **TE UREWERA**

Te Waimana Kaaku Hapu have appointed their representatives to Te Waimana Kaaku Te Ūrewera Committee. The role of this Committee is to support the development of Te Kawa ō Te Ūrewera by meeting and discussing what the future management of Te Urewera will look like. When first initiated, the role of the Committee was also to work alongside and support our Biodiversity Manager, Tom Brown.

Two hui have been held recently, discussing key kaupapa regarding how Te Ūrewera should be looked after and by whom, in the coming years.

The Te Ūrewera Management Plan is to be a working document in April 2017, which is only six months away.

## TE WAIMANA KAAKU TRUST

<u>Hapu Booklets</u> - Congratulations to the three Pa that have complete their Hapu booklets. There is further opportunity for other Pa to complete their own Hapu booklets. Hapu are asked to confirm their researcher/s via a Hapu/Pa hui and then inform Te Waimana Kaaku Trust through the Tari.

<u>He Puna Matauranga</u> - The Trust will be capturing interviews with 12 Pakeke, 12 Ringa Raupa and 12 Rangatahi. We are asking Hapu to suggest participants or interested parties to contact Te Waimana Kaaku Trust through the Tari.
